On December 30th, 2022 I can say that I was honored to be a part of the department's changing of the guard. It is an honor to be sworn in as only the 9th Fire Chief of Harlem-Roscoe Fire. Although Chief Shoevlin has retired and I am attempting to fill very large shoes, that does not mean that our number one priority has changed. That is and always will be providing the best service to the communities that we serve.

The department will continue to strive to provide the best possible services to the community. Over the years since the inception of the Harlem-Roscoe Fire Protection District those services have drastically changed. When the "Fire Department" began, it was strictly a volunteer department to provide fire extinguishment to the community. As the community has grown so has the need for services. Those services continue to change even today.

I think most people think that as firefighters we fight fire on a constant basis, which is untrue. Our number one service that we provide is by far Emergency Medical Services. That consists of roughly 80% of what we do. We have highly trained Paramedics and EMTs that I feel provide exceptional pre-hospital care.

Another extremely important service we provide as a Protection district is to all of the businesses in our communities. We provide annual inspections of businesses, this ensures that these businesses are within adopted fire codes. This means things as simple as properly charged fire extinguishers as well as light up exit signs. Our fire bureau takes great pride in ensuring that our businesses are providing a safe work environment for their employees.

Our firefighters also play an extremely important role with fire safety. They provide safety talks at the schools, to the Scouts, and anyone who asks! The firefighters also will install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors as requested, many times they will notice the need while on medical calls and handle it right then and there if time allows.

Needless to say I am not only proud and honored to be a part of the department but am extremely proud to have the opportunity to lead it into the future. I realize that I am just the figure head though, the ones who truly make this department great are all of our members. They are the ones who make the difference in the community. I am proud to lead them.

Harlem-Roscoe Fire would like to introduce our new Fire Chief, Patrick Trollop. Trollop was sworn in as Fire Chief on Dec. 30th. at Fire Station #1.

Chief Trollop joined the department in 2012. He was promoted to Lieutenant on Feb. 13, 2015 and to Captain on Sept. 23, 2019. He was sworn in as a full-time Battalion Chief on July 27, 2020. On Dec. 30th, 2022 he was sworn in as the department's 9th Chief.

He was an EMT-B when joining the department and became a Paramedic in 2013. Patrick currently oversees the Special Operations Division and is the Disaster Preparedness Coordinator for the department. Patrick received the HRFD Firefighter of the Year award in both 2017 as well as in 2019.

Patrick served in the United States Marine Corps from 1998-2002, during that time he gained the rank of Corporal and was an Infantry Squad Leader. During his time in the Marines, he served in the Far East as well as the Middle East.

Since joining Harlem-Roscoe Fire, Patrick has obtained multiple state certifications from the Office of the State Fire Marshal. Patrick has his Bachelor's degree in Public Safety Management from Southern Illinois University. Patrick has obtained the Illinois Professional Emergency Management certification from the Illinois Emergency Management Agency. 


HRFD FIRE CHIEFS

Chief John Kelley 1944 to 1944


Chief Kelley ran a gravel and excavating business in Roscoe.

Chief McDonald ran a car lot and was owner of a Shell Service Station.




Chief Howard Rogers "Cobby" 1952 to 1965

Happy New Year to everyone! Well, the holidays are behind us and so far is has been a fairly mild beginning to the winter season. As you know here in the Midwest that can

change in a heartbeat, so you need to make sure that you are ready until the flowers start blooming again. The following are some safety tip reminders for the wintertime:

Home Safety

- 1. Test your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms monthly. Even if you have the newer sealed 10-year detectors it gives you the piece of mind that they are working.
- 2. Make sure your house number is visible from the street, in a time of an emergency it is very helpful to fire and police to find your address.
- 3. Make sure you have 2 ways out of your home and have the snow and ice removed for access, this help you get out and us get in if there is an emergency.
- 4. Make sure you have flashlights, fresh batteries, and a weather radio in case the power goes out.
- 5. If you are going to use a generator, make sure it is outdoors and not near or windows or doors also do not run it in the garage even if the door is open.
- 6. If you are using a portable electric heater turn it off when you leave the room, nearly ½ of space heater fires involve electric space heaters.

Vehicle Safety

- 1. Do or have an overall check done on your vehicle, breakdowns in the when the weather is nice are agitating, but breakdowns in the winter can be deadly.
 - Check your cooling system and antifreeze, along with cooling your engine it also provides heat for your vehicle. Also check to make sure your defrosters are working.
 - Check your battery along with your charging system and belts, extreme cold can take a toll on your battery especially if it is older. More battery power is needed to start a car in the winter compared to the warmer months
 - Make sure your wiper blades are good and that your wiper fluid is full, nothings worse than following other vehicles and not being able to clean your windshield!
 - Tires, Tires, Tires! Make sure you have good tires and tread because that is the only thing between your car and the snow on the road.
- 2. Give yourself extra time to get to your destination. Rushing to get to work and dealing with the snowy roads it a recipe for an accident to happen.
- 3. If you get stuck or break down follow these rules.
 - Stay with your car and do not overexert yourself
 - Put a bright marker on the antenna and keep your dome light on.

- Don't run your car for long periods. Make sure your exhaust is clear of snow and run it just to keep warm.
- 4. Put together a winter safety kit in case you get stuck or break down ice scraper, sand or kitty litter if you are stuck, and even a small shovel
 - Jumper cables, flashlight, flares or light markers
 - Cellphone, charger, water and food (granola bars, snacks)
 - Blankets, gloves and hats (just in case you forgot yours)

Spring will be here before you know it, but follow these suggestions to make the winter months a little more bearable and safe!!



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UPDATED ILLINOIS SMOKE ALARM LAW - Effective January 1, 2023 -

In 2017, the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance worked with the General Assembly to pass a law which will require Illinois residents to replace their old smoke alarms with the type that has a long-term, 10-year sealed battery beginning January 1, 2023. This would apply to residents that are still using alarms with removable batteries or alarms that are not hardwired.



- Since 1988, all dwellings in Illinois have been required to have smoke alarms.
- In 2017, Public Act 100-0200 was passed to update the Illinois Smoke Detector Act to reflect advances in alarm technology.
- Come January 1, 2023, any new smoke alarm being installed within a single or muti-family home are required to be featured with a 10-year sealed battery.
- Smoke alarms in single or multi-family homes prior to January 1, 2023 may remain in place until they exceed 10 years from their manufactured date, fails to respond to operability tests, or otherwise malfunctions.

Exemptions

- Homes built after 1988 that already have hardwired smoke alarms.
- Homes with wireless integrated alarms that use low-power radio frequency communications, Wi-Fi, or other Wireless Local Area Networking capability.
